

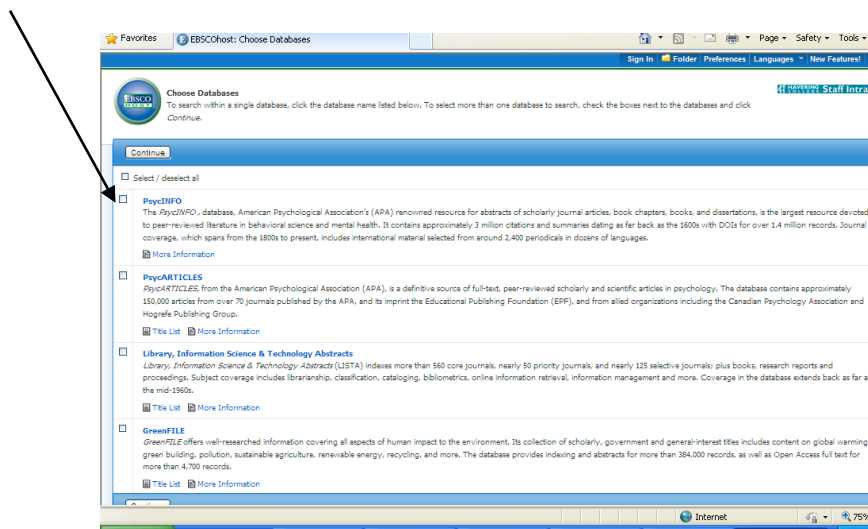
No. 10 How to ... access EBSCOhost Databases

EBSCOHost gives access to five databases, which can be searched individually or collectively:

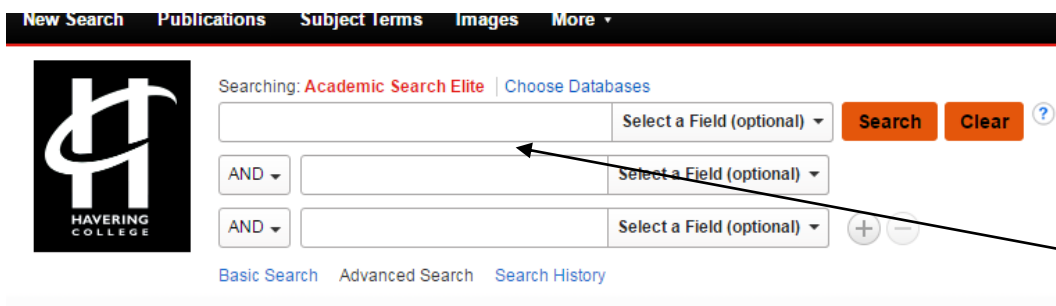
- **Academic Search Elite** – full text and abstracts covering counselling, creative arts, education, engineering, music and social policy and more.
- **eBook & eClassics Collection** – eBooksof classic texts e.g. Dickens etc.
- **GreenFILE** – abstracts and full text covering all aspects of human impact to the environment.
- **Library, Information Science & Technology Abstracts (LISTA)**

You can access these databases from iPAC, from the LRC Online Databases page on the Student Intranet or via your *ATHENS* account (select the **EBSCOhost Databases**).

1. Either tick the Select box(es) next to the databases you wish to search or click on the database title to start.

- Abstract:** Sexual addiction is prevalent among college students and warrants continued examination. Using a descriptive discriminant analysis, the authors assessed differences in attachment style and religious coping between students in the clinical range of sexual addiction (n = 56) and those in the nonclinical range (n = 270). Results indicated significant differences between the 2 groups, with a large effect size. Specifically, attachment anxiety and negative religious coping were most responsible for the explained variance. [ABSTRACT FROM AUTHOR]
